



# ChancesR: Re-Entry, Reunification, and Recovery

## Fact Sheet November 2011

The Beaver County ChancesR: Re-Entry, Reunification, and Recovery Program began successful implementation in March 2011 and focuses on Beaver County residents with a substance use disorder (SUD) or a co-occurring substance use and mental health disorder (COD), and who have been sentenced for their crimes to the Beaver County Jail. ChancesR addresses the issues that hinder an offender's successful return to the community upon release from jail and places an emphasis on the difficulties those released face in obtaining and keeping employment. This fact sheet displays some information showcasing the first six-months of successful implementation of the ChancesR Program.

### General Descriptive Information

Since implementation, there have been **143 individuals** enrolled into the program. The figure on the right displays the gender and ethnicity of individuals enrolled into the program.<sup>1</sup> There are twice as many Caucasian clients than African American as well as twice as many males than females. For those who had their criminal charges listed at the time of admission<sup>2</sup>, the average number of charges was 1.6 (ranging from one to five).



### Treatment Service Needs

The figure on the left displays the distribution of treatment needs along with the percentage of clients who have enrolled in the services. While almost all clients have been assessed as needing Cognitive Based, Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse services, less than one-third are actually enrolling in such needed services.

### Pro-Social Services

- During the first six-months, there were seventeen clients receiving pro-social services from either R.O.O.T.S. or Trails Ministries.
- During this time, sixteen clients were receiving employment services from Beaver County Rehabilitation Center (BCRC).

<sup>2</sup> There are completed CSI intake interviews submitted for 95 (66.4%) of the 143 clients enrolled. Of these 95 clients, five were missing criminal charge information.
